Message from the President

Tariffs, Supply Chain issues, ever-increasing construction pricing, oh my! 2025 has been anything but stable, but this isn't a surprise. Whether Republican or Democrat, whenever there is a change of hands in the Executive Office, uncertainty ripples through the market for the first few months of the new President taking office. At some point, maybe six months or longer, things begin to stabilize as the major power shifts have taken place and the future becomes clearer. However, this year seems as though the pace and uncertainty have been compounded significantly in just six months.

As I write this article, the Russia-Ukraine war is still active, Israel bombed Iran, and the US provided strategic air strikes on underground nuclear missile sites in Iran by using a pair of B-2 Bombers that flew a 36-hour mission from Missouri to Iran and back in one night. These are the things that are taking place around the world. In the US, the construction industry has faced threats of tariffs that could increase by 30% or more, which prompted many suppliers to only hold pricing for a 24-hour period. This has made it extremely difficult from an owner's perspective to know if they have enough money to even build the project.

So, what do you do? Well, doing nothing is always the first option you consider, but in many cases, this isn't the best option. Candidly, as I look at the best leaders in any organization, it's their Emotional Resilience that makes all the difference. If you're not familiar with Emotional Resilience, it's the ability to stay calm and collected through stressful situations. The word 'resilience' comes from the Latin word 'resilio', which means 'to bounce back' or retaliate.

At this year's Spring Street Conference in Montrose, Colorado, I met someone who exemplifies Emotional Resilience. Our keynote speaker for this year's conference was Montrose County Manager Frank Rodriguez. Frank served in the United States Army for 24 years with eight deployments and earned five Bronze Star medals, two with Valor for his actions in combat. As I talked to Frank before the conference, I was inspired by his incredible leadership experience coupled with humility. His experience included working as a Police Chief and the Deputy Commissioner of Criminal Investigations Division for the North Carolina Department of Insurance, where he led Special Agents across the state investigating complex Fraud Crimes ranging from intricate schemes to homicides. What he is most proud of, however, is his 32 years of marriage, three children, and two grandsons.



I was looking forward to hearing his keynote speech titled "Making a Difference" to kick off the conference on Tuesday morning. However, shortly after I left my office in Westminster, I got the type of phone call that every conference organizer dreads. As I answered my phone, I recognized Frank's voice, but this time he had a much more serious tone. He came right out to tell me, "John, I just got let go from the County." Silence filled my car as I took a deep breath, waiting for him to tell me he wasn't going to be able to give his keynote speech for our conference. What happened next, however, was not at all what I expected. He said, "John, if it's ok with you, I'd still like to give my talk to your conference attendees." I took another deep breath and replied, "Yes, of course, I would be honored to have you present in light of this recent news, as long as it's the right thing for you to do." He agreed, and his speech was one of the most moving speeches I've heard in a long time, as he shared unclassified information about real combat situations he led in Afghanistan and the leadership lessons he learned and shared with our attendees. You could hear a pin drop as Frank gave his talk in the auditorium that morning.

It would have been understandable for Frank to bow out of his speech, given the new circumstances that he was in. However, I can only imagine that through his military training, this wasn't the first, nor the most difficult situation he's been in, far from it! However, he is someone, probably like many of you reading this, who has worked on Emotional Resiliency their entire lives and knows how to keep moving through difficult situations, and not quit, give up, or sit and do nothing. Getting to know men like Frank encourages me to embrace my own Emotional Resilience when faced with a challenging situation and lead others with a calm and collected manner, knowing I'll do whatever it takes to support the team and get the job done.

38th Annual Spring Street Conference Flourishes Someplace New

Professionals in the public works and transportation industries are always looking to improve the way we do business and serve the community. To achieve this, we need to share ideas, learn from the best, and change the way we think about our transportation systems.

Over the course of two-and-a-half days, colleagues from throughout Colorado came together to share best practices and lessons learned to improve public works operations and processes. This year, the annual Spring Street Conference tried something new and moved down to Montrose, CO, April 15-17. The conference was a

success and participants enjoyed the new conference center and hospitality locations.



The conference featured informative sessions on new approaches to overcoming today's public works challenges and implementing successful new practices and ideas. Over 170 participants came together to learn how they can reinvent their operations to make their communities safer, greener, and more efficient.

The Conference was kicked off by former Montrose County Manager, Chief of Police, and Veteran, Frank Rodriguez, who inspired attendees to Make a Difference. Workforce

development sessions covered a wide variety of topics from local agency paving specifications, gravel road stabilization, and pavement recycling to right-of-way inspections, electric vehicle fleets, and CDL updates. Lead-

ership topics covered Supervising, Managing, and Leading; how these skills differ and when to use them. Participants' favorite session was the Public Works Bridge Rescue at the Blue Mesa Project in Gunnison. It provided a good example of how cities and counties can show and tell their successes, share the challenges overcome, as well as impart lessons learned along the way. The ROW Inspections session reminded us that during the summer construction season, monitoring for stormwater violations and maintaining erosion control



measures is essential to protecting infrastructure, ensuring compliance, and reducing environmental impact. Golden explained the management of their 32-hour Public Works condensed work week, Boulder provided best practices for generating positive community engagement, and Littleton illustrated the importance of Public Works departments being prepared to coordinate with emergency services and utility providers to assess critical disaster situations while prioritizing safety and minimizing disruptions.

A great big THANK YOU to all the Montrose County and City of Montrose staff that made the move of our event a triumph! Thank you to all our Sponsors, and the APWA's CARMA Committee Members that helped make this 38th annual training event a success again this year. We appreciate the public works agencies and individuals being open to new ideas and leadership possibilities that can raise everyone to new heights. We look forward to you joining us next year at the Montrose County Event Center!

Awards will be presented in each category for extraordinary Colorado projects and programs as well as individual achievement. Nominations are limited to NEW projects that have not been previously submitted for an award to this program. Projects eligible for this year's awards would have been completed between July 1, 2024 and June 30, 2025.

The APWA Colorado Chapter judges will be selecting one Project / Program of the Year from all the nominations submitted regardless of category and community size. Please note: The Project/Program of the Year/category winners will be expected to be submitted to the APWA National Awards program. The Chapter Board encourages all nominations submit to the National APWA Awards Program.

You may nominate more than one project/program per category, but each nomination must be submitted separately. More than one nomination in the same category from the same agency is not exclusionary!

Nominations are due by midnight, August 1, 2025! (This deadline will not be extended)

Nominations will only be accepted using the Awards Nomination Submittal Form for Projects/Programs available on the Colorado Chapter website: <u>APWA Colorado Awards</u>. Administration	Software implementations, accreditation attainment, certification programs, education programs
Structures	Public Structures, preservation/rehabilitation, municipal buildings
Parks and Trails	Roads, bridges, mass transit
Environment	Parks, trails, pedestrian and bicycle facilities
Operations / Maintenance	Treatment and recycling facilities, landfill reclamation, sewer projects, water projects, flood control, pipeline
Disaster or Emergency Construction, Repair or Response	Maintenance operations are defined as scheduled actions or programs that are regularly completed by public works departments. Includes preventative maintenance, corrective maintenance and recurring maintenance or rehabilitation of buildings, structures or infrastructure such as roadways, storm sewer, sanitary sewer, facilities, etc.
Sustainability	Efficient delivery of infrastructure in an environmentally and socially responsible way that ensures the best choice in the long term.
Public Outreach	Recognition of a public works agency that has developed public outreach programs or special events such as Public Works Week activities that demonstrates awareness and understanding of public works operations and issues, promotes the value of public works and educates the public.

Community Category:

- Small Community (under 25,000 in population)
- Medium Community (25,000-100,000 in population)
- Large Community (over 100,000 in population)

Accomplishment for the nominated Project or Program Criteria Participation

- Innovation: Has the program/project found new methods to provide better service to the public or to internal customers
- Achievement: Did the completed project or program achieve all set goals?
- Transferable: Is the resulting improvement and innovation transferable to other communities and situations?
- Cooperation: Was there special cooperation between individuals, agencies, citizens, businesses and the general public?

Outstanding Public Works Employee	This award is given to an individual at the operational level (first line supervisor or below) who performs his/her responsibilities at an exceptionally efficient and courteous manner. Nominees need not be a member of APWA, but must have been employed by a public works-related agency for a period of not less than five years.
Professional Manager of the Year - Administrative Mgmt.	The Professional Manager of the Year Award in Administrative Management seeks to recognize outstanding achievement in the area of administration within the public works field and to inspire excellence and dedication in the public sector by recognizing the outstanding career achievements of administrative professionals.
Professional Manager of the Year - Transportation	The Professional Manager of the Year Award in the Transportation category seeks to recognize excellence and dedication by recognizing the outstanding career service achievements, exceptional leadership, and management of public transportation professionals.
Professional Manager of the Year - Water Resources (Water and Sewer)	The Professional Manager of the Year Award in the Water Resources category seeks to inspire excellence and dedication by recognizing the outstanding career service achievements, exceptional leadership and management of potable water and sanitary sewer professionals.
Professional Manager of the Year - Fleet Maintenance	The Professional Manager of the Year Award in the Public Fleet category seeks to recognize excellence and dedication in the public sector by recognizing the outstanding career service achievements and exceptional leadership of public fleet management professionals.
Professional Manager of the Year - Drainage & Flood Control	The Professional Manager of the Year Award in the Drainage and Flood Control category seeks to recognize excellence and dedication by recognizing the outstanding career service achievements and exceptional leadership of stormwater management and flood control professionals.







Colorado Municipal League Annual Conference

APWA Colorado Participates in 2025 Conference and Showcases new Engineering Resource



The Colorado Municipal League (CML) is a nonprofit, nonpartisan organization established in 1923, representing the interests of 271 cities and towns across the state. Approximately 25 attendees participated in the session, including City Council members, city attorneys, consultants, and city engineering staff. Over 70 hard copies of the MERG were distributed, alongside a one-page summary describing the CO-APWA Board and the organization's mission.




